UNIFORM SURVEY RESULTS

A department wide uniform survey was conducted recently and the results were as follows:

180 surveys distributed 143 responses received 79% response rate.

112 males29 females

2 unknown

- 91.9% of respondents believe that Facilities is easily identifiable on campus.
- 76.4% of respondents would like to see the uniform updated.
- 69% of respondents are not willing to pay any out of pocket expense for uniforms even if provided with a nicer quality uniform.
- 68.3% of respondents would be willing to purchase their own bottoms if provided with a stipend to do so.
- 56.7% of respondents would like to see all departments in the same colors.
- 53.7% of respondents do not think that supervisors should be in different clothing than technicians.



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Tom and Jerry Homecoming

Located at the edge of Bowman Field, near Tillman Hall, are two bronze 6-pounder cannons that were manufactured in Massachusetts during the mid-1800s. The term "6-pounder" refers to the weight of the cannon balls fired.

In the mid 1930's a sculptor by the name of A. Wolf Davidson was working on two projects simultaneously; a bust of South Carolina Governor Ira C. Blackwood and the statue of Thomas Green Clemson.

The Governor's office learned about the Clemson project and offered to give Davidson two bronze cannons that were stored in the basement of the state capitol building. The idea was to use the cannons to provide some of the bronze needed for the Clemson statue.

Because there was insufficient funding to complete the Clemson statue in bronze, it was cast in stone instead. Subsequently, Davidson was not sure what to do with the cannons when a professor of Industrial Engineering, Edwin Freemen said that he could store

the cannons in the Shop Building on campus. The building had doors large enough for the cannons to pass through. The cannons were then covered up in the basement and forgotten about until after World War II.

After World War II the University received a quantity of surplus machinery which required a larger machine shop. When the old shop was cleared out the cannons were rediscovered.

In October of 1951 Lieutenant Colonel James B. Jones used a \$50 donation from his father, John Jones, Sr. (Clemson class of 1915), to have the cannons mounted on cement pedestals on either side of a flag pole located on Bowman Field. Lt. Col. Jones stated that "The cannons are being placed by the Military Department, with the aid of Mr. Watson of the service division, in an attempt to make the campus more attractive."

The cannons were nicknamed "Tom and Jerry," most likely by the class of 1952. The Pershing Rifles began using the cannons as part of their induction process. Cadets guard the cannons 24 hours a day during "cannon week" and polish the barrels.

Howard Holland's daughter Majayla won the 3A state championships for discus and shot put for the Seneca Bobcats and has been named the Anderson *Independent Mail's* "Girls Track Athlete of the Year" for the second time. She also won the award as a sophomore.

Majayla has been around track much of her life. Her father, siblings, and cousins have been associated with the Seneca High athletic program over the years. Bobcats coach Karl Addis said, "They're kind of like the Mannings of football for Seneca Track."

"She's kind of been the face of our program for the last couple of years," Addis said.

"She's a good student. She cares about her family, cares about her grades, does what she's supposed to and goes to the house. She's a great kid and a good example for our younger kids to look up to and say 'If I do what she does, I can accomplish good things."

Majayla was the 3A state champion in the discus for the third straight year, with a best throw of 128 feet, 11 inches. She added a state title in the shot put, too, with a toss of 40-1 1/2.

"Winning both of those my senior year was a dream come true, especially to be on the podium with my little sister (freshman Carisma, who finished second in the shot put and third in the discus)." Majayla said.

Howard said, "I am really proud of her. She listened, worked hard and stayed the course."

In 1996, the cannons were relocated between Military Heritage Plaza and the newer bronze Thomas Green Clemson statue cast in 1966. In 2013, Professor Chris Pagano and Pershing Rifles Cadet Kathleen Strathman were allotted capital Improvement funds by the Class of 2014 to purchase authentic carriages for Tom and Jerry. The purpose was to further improve the attractiveness of the campus by

replacing the plain looking cement base. The cannons were removed and the cement base was demolished in March of 2014. Cast aluminum

carriages were manufactured by Steen Cannons of Ashland, Kentucky. On June 30, 2014, University Facilities staff reinstalled the cannons on Bowman Field in front of Godfrey Hall.





Watt Family Innovation Center



The Watt Family Innovation Center will be a cutting-edge facility that will enhance the intellectual core of Clemson University's campus. Flanked by Cooper Library on one side and the Strom Thurmond Institute on the other, it will face the Class of 1956 Academic Success Center and create a showplace that will foster academic collaboration and student engagement. It will also represent Clemson's commitment to research, technology, student engagement and competitive infrastructure.

In response to reports from some of the nation's most respected news sources, the Watt Family Innovation Center will address America's potential of losing its edge in innovation, research and technology to other nations. By facilitating student engagement as well as student and faculty involvement across the disciplines, the Center aims to develop technologies and solve every side of the issues at hand. The Center answers the challenges posed by the University's 2020 Road Map to "drive innovation, through research

and service, that stimulates economic growth, creates jobs and solves problems."

At 66,000 square feet in size, three stories tall and with its center-of-campus location, the Watt Family Innovation Center will serve as a liaison among all Clemson University students, faculty, departments, colleges and specialized researchers. It will also provide a significant amount of space for teaching and research in science, technology and engineering, preparing a new generation of highly trained scholars who can take ideas from concept to marketplace. This project will leverage Clemson's current technological assets and help to attract additional public and private investment.


The building will be adaptable to serve the ever-changing needs of Clemson's increasingly diverse student community. It will have a robust infrastructure — making it flexible enough to accommodate current and emerging technologies with minimal cost and effort. It will reflect a modern, real-world

approach to teaching, research and learning through experiential, issue-based, solution-driven education.

The building will also be LEED Silver Certified, meaning the elements of energy efficiency, proper water use, indoor air-quality monitoring and storm-water management will be addressed.

- * 94.4% of respondents still have the uniforms originally assigned to them.
- 82.3% of those who still have their uniforms actually wear them.

Given the issues of importance, Comfort/Fit was the most important feature at 4.42 out of 5; Durability was a close second at 4.24, and then style and the option to coordinate pieces came in at 3.57 and 3.47 respectively.

This feedback will give the uniform committee helpful information for going forward with the decision making process. Stay tuned!
